1 million implanted globally (Zeng,2022) But still lack of access to CI and services... WHY?

- Lack of awareness of CI (www.ehima.com/surveys)
- Lack of referrals, audiologists and ENTs not aware of criteria
- Funding challenges particularly in low and middle income countries: (World Hearing Report, 2022, WHO)
- Problems with hearing screening programmes for adults but even for children eg in the UK: www.dailymail.co.uk/news/articles-121561115
- Problems with CI services eg S Australia where children not being well managed after CI (Messenger, A. 2023, November 8).
- Lack of follow up processes and traceability
- Education parents' biggest problem

Our online survey of adults with CI

- A global survey with both qualitative and quantitative questions
- The views of adults with CIs about their experiences of the services they receive
- Over 1,000 responses from 40 countries

☐ Results: high satisfaction rates even in the older patients... BUT ...

- □ Little or no rehabilitation for adults
- □ Challenges in managing the technology long term
- Ongoing funding challenges which could lead to non-use





□105 respondents were implanted as children and are now adults



Satisfaction is high with CI

- My cochlears have given me a life I never would have had.
 I'm able to attend school and college, work and support my
 self, and enjoy laughing with friends and family as well as
 music and things other kids enjoy. I am forever grateful!
- Am so used to it without my Cl can't do anything.
- Super satisfied!
- I've always heard through a cochlear so it's all I know..
 Without my implant I can do nothing....
- This is a huge responsibility for us all working in CI services

What would they like?

- More robust, waterproof, staying on in sports
- Regular maintenance: Its important for people to know who they can go to when their implants aren't working, if they need spare parts and so on.
- Accessible appointments: Communication for appointments is not accessible and creates problems
- Greater control: I want to manage my own settings

Specific challenges to these young adults:

- This group are the first to grow up being deaf but hearing with CI
- Lack of understanding of needs (CI can work too well): we talk well, but we actually remain deaf and don't have perfect hearing in many situations
- Meeting others: It impacts our social, mental health, culture and knowledge. Its important that CI users should be connected to each other and be confident that they are not only ones with this experience
- Opportunities to advocate: It is hard to feel that you constantly have to fight for what you deserve even if is in the law.
- All the while, we could be deaf again in a snap. It's frightening and hard to think about.


Lifelong services: for 90 years and more...


- Many people get their cochlears later in life when they may have 20 years to live or less but not me. I may have mine for 80 or more years. I've already had them 19 years so I'm facing issues the older generation knows nothing about
- Plus all the lifetime issues that we are going to face in an ever changing world of medical growth- the devices must be maintained, upgraded and repaired.
- I will have my CI s all my life. I should have support for them all my life.
- Ongoing costs; they are not financially secure:
- These costs are phenomenal and private insurance rarely covers.
- We wish the high prices for our CIs would come down, it is impossible to get the new accessories, new processors etc


